Some of the information is okay, but some is inaccurate. For instance, the author obviously doesn't know much about growing potatoes; I get significantly higher yields in much less space. He devotes a significant amount of space to identifying harmful insects and talks about the pesticides that can be used to control them, which would be highly unrealistic in a true "survival" situation. It would be much more appropriate to discuss ways to prevent/minimize pests to have healthy soil and plants without the need for expensive chemical treatments. Additionally, there is very little on how to garden so that the food lasts year-round -- another necessity in a true "survival" situation.For beginning gardeners, a better book would be All New Square Foot Gardening, Second Edition: The Revolutionary Way to Grow More In Less Space. Another good book would be The Winter Harvest Handbook: Year Round Vegetable Production Using Deep Organic Techniques and
