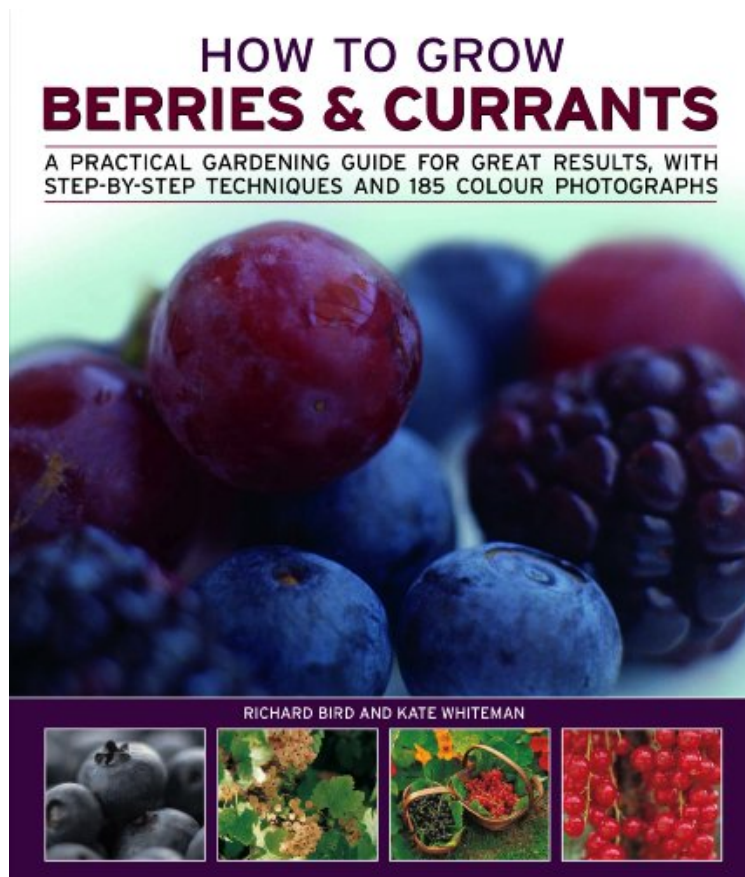

11 of 13 people found the following review helpful. very disappointingBy farm folkBuyer beware! Nothing in the description of this book told me that it was written and published in the UK. Had I known that I would not have bought it. While it may be okay for general culture, the specifics are not very useful for American gardeners. For example, variety names were generally not found in the western US. Of the 30 plus strawberry cultivars named, none were what you would find in the US. Of the 20 plus raspberries, only 3 were familiar and of the 18 blackberry varieties only 5 were familiar. Some terminology was unfamiliar, there was no mention of 'day neutral' strawberries, very common and popular for US home gardens. Diseases were also unfamiliar, and maybe not common in the US. I also ordered the 'Growing Greens' title by Mr. Bird, and was more dissappointed than the berry book. Besides being quite basic, none of the varieties named were familiar. I certainly would not buy any other books in this series.
